TIMELESS TORAH

VAYERA - The Strength to Climb the Mountain

Society of the Valley

Parshat Vayera contains several different narratives - each one independently significant - but the central portion of the parshah is devoted to the account of the destruction of Sodom. Sodom was the affluent but immoral city to which Lot, Avraham's nephew, had relocated, but their wickedness had now come to a head and the entire area was to be destroyed. Notably, throughout this lengthy passage, Sodom is portrayed as being in a low place, in a valley, and the verses emphasise that both the angels and Avraham 'looked out over Sodom' (18:16, 19:28). Both literally and figuratively, their perspective on Sodom was loftier and broader than that of its inhabitants, and it is this imagery that will help us understand what transpired in this episode.

In several places throughout the Torah (see, for example, Devarim 15:9), we find that the prayers of a pauper, a widow or an orphan are particularly potent; their cries arouse Hashem's mercy and can lead to particularly negative consequences for the perpetrators of any oppression shown towards them. Here too, the iniquity of Sodom is described as 'weighty' and the cries of their victims as 'having come before Hashem' (18:20-21). Rabbeinu Bechaye (d.1340) explains that from these words, we understand that a significant element of their sinful behaviour was their persecution of the disadvantaged among them. But in Sodom, it was not only individuals who behaved cruelly to others; as a society, Sodom was rotten - the antithesis of kindness even towards those closest to them. As a case in point, the Gemara in Sanhedrin (109b) relates the story of a young woman who had compassion on a pauper in Sodom and gave

him a piece of bread to eat. This was considered a crime, and when it was discovered, the people of Sodom punished her with unimaginable torture. In Sodom, the notion of parting with one's own possessions to uplift the lives of others was abhorrent to the extent that it was considered immoral.

When the people of Sodom realised that Lot was harbouring the angels as guests, a mob formed outside Lot's house, clamouring to lynch the unwanted visitors. As they came close to breaking down the door and entering the house, the angels struck them with blindness, and they were unable to cause Lot and his family any harm. This blindness, while certainly literal, was also symbolic. Blindness, the Metzudot David (Kings II, 6:18) explains, is not only the absence of sight but the absence of true recognition. Sodom was not merely a wicked city but a dystopian environment that had developed a total blindness towards its own faults.

Light From Within

From his vantage point on the clifftop, Avraham had a commanding view of the metropolis of Sodom and its surrounding cities. But more importantly, his perspective was also morally advantageous. Avraham's desire for *chessed* (kindness) and his aspirations to bring goodness to others was in sharp contrast to the values of Sodom, and Avraham yearned for them to see the light. In his courageous prayer to save Sodom, Avraham beseeched Hashem to find at least a small number of righteous individuals in each city whose merit would be enough to redeem their neighbours. According to Rav Hirsch (d.1888), the key words in this prayer are '*tzaddikim b'toch ha'ir* - righteous people **within** the city'. Avraham understood that

positive influences among the people could bring them eventually to mend their ways, and he argued that even if only a handful of such righteous people existed, this should be enough to save Sodom from destruction. Only when Hashem assured him that there were no such *tzaddikim* did Avraham admit that there was indeed no hope for them. Sodom would never be able to see the light

Lot, however, did not fully share his neighbours' depraved values and he was willing to risk his life to offer shelter to wayfarers. Why is it, then, that his presence could not fulfil the positive influence that Sodom was lacking?

Although Lot originally begged the angels to allow him to remain in the neighbouring town of Tzoar, he eventually became afraid to stay there and escaped to a cave in the mountainside, far from the cities of Sodom. Rashi explains that Lot's reluctance to travel up the mountain was because he knew that the further up he travelled, the closer he would get to Avraham. He knew that as long as he was among the Sodomites, he was considered righteous whereas in comparison to Avraham, his merits were negligible. In this respect, Lot was the opposite of the *tzaddikim* for whom Avraham searched. Far from attempting to influence his neighbours for the better, Lot was happy with their low level of spirituality because it put him in a better light. In the words of the Sages (*Pirkei Avot* 4:15), he preferred to be a 'head of foxes' rather than a 'tail of lions'.

Climbing the Mountain

The most striking element of the test of *Akeidat Yitzchak* (The Binding of Isaac) is the contradiction that remains unresolved even after the episode ends. On the one

hand, Avraham knew without a doubt that Yitzchak would be the progenitor of a great nation. On the other hand, he also knew that he was to offer Yitzchak as a sacrifice before Yitzchak had himself fathered any children.

The verses relate that Avraham travelled for three days together with Yitzchak and two servants until he finally saw his destination ahead of him. At that point, he instructed his servants to remain with the donkey while he and Yitzchak would continue alone. Elaborating on this, Rabbeinu Bechaye cites a Midrash that when Avraham saw the Divine Presence on top of Mount Moriah, he asked his companions what they could see. While Yitzchak could indeed perceive the Divine Presence, the two servants could see nothing but wilderness and mountains. Avraham's instruction to them to remain with the donkey was an insinuation that with such a perspective, they would be destined to remain in the valley. Only someone with the clarity of vision to see the Divine from within the confusion is able to ascend the mountain.

Indeed, the eventual name of the very site of the *Akeida* - Yerushalayim - alludes to this. Yerushalayim is a portmanteau of 'yir'eh - He will see' and 'shalem - complete'. The success of the *Akeidah* was Avraham and Yitzchak's ability to see through the unanswerable contradictions towards a sense of ultimate completion, infused with an awareness of Hashem's presence. It was this which enabled them to ascend from the valley of darkness to the pinnacle of the mountain.

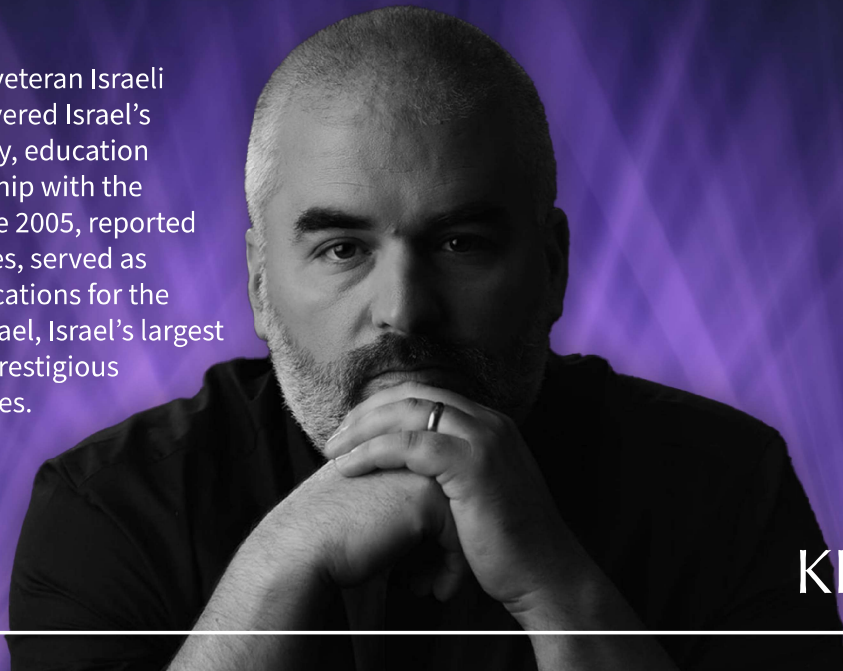
