Haman the loser



Haman is thunderstruck. He was looking forward to being publicly honoured by the king – and now He's supposed to be the one to lead his enemy Mordecai through the streets? But Haman is obedient; there's no space for discussion.

And Mordecai? How his jaw must have dropped when he saw Haman coming along

After the journey through the city Mordecai returns to the king's gate (v12) – where he had been before. The honour he had just received therefore hadn't gone to his head. This is commendable for Christians to imitate!

Haman makes his way home. He has hit rock bottom. Is his wife able to comfort him; will his counsellors help him? No, they only say what he himself had already thought: His defeat is certain.

16. Can you imagine why Haman covered his head (v12)?

When the Jews celebrate the feast of Purim, the whole book of Esther is read out aloud. When the person who reads gets to the verses of today's passage, he changes his voice and continues with a high, triumphant voice.

16. When someone covers their face, they show outwardly that they were very sad. You can find this in other passages, such as 2 Samuel Covering can have another reason. In the next chapter, Haman's head is covered because he is condemned to death (ch. 7:8)
