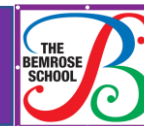


Curriculum Overview: Year 9 History

<p>Topic: Why was WWI a world war?</p> <p><i>A module exploring the reasons for the outbreak of WWI. Pupils will then explore conditions on the Western Front and key battles, including soldiers who fought for Britain from around the world. Pupils will then explore how WWI ended.</i></p>	<p>Topic: How did life change during the inter-war years?</p> <p><i>A module exploring life after the end of WWI in Europe and the USA.</i></p>	<p>Topic: Why was WWII a world war?</p> <p><i>A module exploring the events which led to the outbreak of WWII. Pupils will also explore key events of WWII including the evacuation of Dunkirk and the Battle of Britain.</i></p>	<p>Topic: Was the Holocaust destined to happen?</p> <p><i>A module exploring what life was like for minority groups in Germany before WWII. Pupils will then explore how minority groups were persecuted throughout WWII.</i></p>	<p>Topic: How did WWII end?</p> <p><i>A module exploring the key turning points in WWII which led to the eventual end of the war, including D-Day; Pearl Harbour; Atomic Bombs; and the liberation and rescue of people in death camps.</i></p>	<p>Topic: How did people protest to change the world?</p> <p><i>A module exploring the key activists and protestors of the 20th century, exploring how protest changed the world and the progress made as a result.</i></p>
<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will draw upon their knowledge of empire to explore the MAIN causes of WWI.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: Was WWI really worth 'winning'?</p>	<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will use their knowledge about the end of WWI to see how it led to changes in Europe.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: Was WWI worth 'winning' for Britain? 'Adolf Hitler would never have become leader of Germany if Germany hadn't been forced to sign the Treaty of Versailles?' Do you agree?</p>	<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will use their knowledge of the rise of Hitler and end of WWI to understand the sequence of events which led to the outbreak of WWII.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: To what extent was the Treaty of Versailles the main reason for WWII?</p>	<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will draw upon their knowledge of Nazi Party beliefs to understand the causes of the Holocaust.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: Has the Holocaust halted persecution of minorities?</p>	<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will use their knowledge of key events from the start of WWII to study how the war ends.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: How did WWII re-shape the world?</p>	<p>Links to prior learning: Pupils will use their knowledge and understanding of slavery to assess the legacy that was left which led to racial segregation within the USA.</p> <p>Stretch and Challenge Enquiry: Is all protest fair and equal?</p>
