

## **Annual Review of Charitable Giving 2024-2025**

The Company makes a number of donations every year from the charitable contributions of Liverymen to the Education and Almshouse Charities, as well as some from the General Charity Account, gifts in kind and fundraising. Highlights from this year include:

The **Knit for Community** project started by Past Master Liz Green during lockdown, continues The total number of blankets made to date now stands at **over 2000**.





Worshipful Company of Framework Knitters 'Knit for Community' initiative has helped over 2,000 individuals

In April 2020, at the start of the pandemic, The Worshipful Company of Framework Knitters began 'Knit for Community'. Our initial aim was to produce 20-30 blankets to support charities in Leicestershire. Thanks to fantastic support from over 700 volunteers across the UK, over 2,000 unique and warm blankets/lap blankets have been created. One of our volunteers heard first hand the difference this made to an individual who, with the cost-of-living crisis, had to choose between heating their home or putting food on the table. The project continues to gain new volunteers who knit/crochet/sew up the squares, and a quote from one of our volunteers during lockdown was particularly poignant '*lt just reminds me that each of us apart can't do much, but TOGETHER we carl*. Members and friends of over 40 Livery companies have supported this initiative to date, and we welcome help from new volunteers, or anyone who would like to donate towards purchasing wool or the cost of sending the blankets to charities. Over the last year **105** full size and **367** lap blankets have been distributed to **7** charities. The costs of wool and distribution are covered from our general charity funds and amounted to **£896** 

**Treloar's School and College**: Four of our beautiful blankets were auctioned at events in support of Treloar's, a school and college for severely disabled children, that has strong, ongoing, links with the City of London. The total raised was £605 We have also donated several lap blankets for students to use when travelling in wheelchairs across outside areas.

**Education Charity bursaries and awards:** A total of 49 students were interviewed this year from 18 universities and colleges. 2 bursaries and 14 awards to the value of £21,000 were made and a further 27 were Highly Commended and received certificates. All are invited to become Associates of the Company.

In addition, £25,170 covered training for 12 students at Shima and £1,050 to provide tools for a technical student at Shima. We are extremely grateful to the Worshipful Company of Drapers who donated £15,000 towards the cost of the Shima training.

**Museum support:** Donations totalling £3,000 were made to Wigston, Hinckley and Ruddington Framework Knitting museums in support of their outreach work.

Livery schools Link: Once again we contributed £125 in support of the Livery Schools Link event



at Guildhall. The event is designed to make young people aware of the range of employment and training opportunities represented by Livery Companies and their members.

The Big Curry Lunch 2024: This annual event raised £402,000 for the Army Benevolent Fund,

The Royal Navy Charity and the RAF Benevolent Fund. We manned our customary stall selling donated socks, knitwear and some of our blankets and raised an impressive £2067. HRH Princess Anne visited the stall and chatted to the Master who presented her with a cashmere scarf from Johnsons of Elgin and a selection of Corgi socks for her and her husband with appropriate designs on them. She was clearly delighted, and the Framework Knitters' stall was mentioned in an article about her busy life in the Telegraph magazine. We also featured on the cover of the 2024 lunch report.

**Leicestershire and Derbyshire Yeomanry statue:** We have an affiliation with this regiment and some senior officers are Liverymen. This national appeal by the Yeomanry Trust for £150,000 is for a life-sized bronze statue of a yeomanry charger. The statue will be located at the head of Yeomanry Avenue at the National Memorial Arboretum. We made a modest donation of £250.

**The Livery Food Initiative:** We are one of the 64 Livery Companies and Guilds supporting this pan-Livery project. The truck we contributed to last year has rescued 321,058 tonnes of food and transported supplies for 764,423 meals. We donated a further £250 to support the project to continue to source and supply much needed food to communities across the City London.

"Standing in this place" statue: The Master was invited to attend the official installation of



Rachel Carter's statue in Nottingham. The statue represents the contribution of thousands of unnamed women who were the driving force behind the East Midlands cotton textile industry during the industrialisation in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Century. We had given a modest donation in support of their appeal last year, and we are

mentioned on the plaque in front of the statue which is situated just outside the Central Nottingham Library.

"Escape from the Tower": This is an annual event undertaken by Livery Masters to raise funds for the British Red Cross. Our Master took part in the event at the Tower of London and a total of £2540 (the largest contribution - possibly reflecting his crimes!) was raised to secure his release.
