


Interests of the Rewilding Network

I am part of / run a group or businesses that is taking rewilding action already.

Key themes & actions

1. Communications & Awareness Raising

- * Liked the importance of keeping things local and focused on Plymouth (like the recent 'Geddon' campaign).
- * The marine world is as important as the terrestrial world—a key thing to weave into our communications more often along with freshwater habitats.
- * The importance of highlighting multiple voices and sharing experiences of nature was emphasised.
- * There was interest in taking something 'common' and reframing it more positively—championing the unsung heroes in the natural world.
- We're going to reflect these multiple perspectives in our communications going forward.

2. Rewilding Greenspaces

- * How can we protect the greenspaces we have in Plymouth and how can we increase green corridors?
- * There was interest in how to rewild and increase biodiversity in both public and private greenspaces.
- Rewilding mindsets—looking at how to best engage the wider community to appreciate how greenspaces can benefit both people and wildlife.
- ⇒ We're going to look into running 'rewilding surgeries'—bringing people together to explain how to rewild greenspaces in the right way.
- Later this year, we'll run a planning & greenspace webinar focused on the policies protecting our natural spaces.

3. Taking Action for Wildlife

- Everyone was keen to learn a range of survey and species identification skills.
- * There was interest in learning more about species for casual interest as well as contributing to longer term monitoring.
- * Most were interested in joining volunteer groups and developing practical conservation skills, but there was also a need to have flexibility to join events as and when they can.
- ⇒ We're launching our Take Action for Wildlife event programme this month!
- ⇒ We're making identifying and recording wildlife easier by putting guides and app recommendations on our knowledge hub.

4. Wildlife Monitoring & Citizen Science

- * Several people were experienced in using wildlife apps and iRecord was the main platform used.
- * Everyone wanted to upskill and share knowledge, with an interest in joining local community groups on evenings or weekends when more people are available outside of work.
- Many wanted a focus to contribute to wildlife monitoring, like doing plant surveys at a specific location.
- ⇒ We ran a <u>Citizen Science webinar</u> in April showing how to record your wildlife sightings through iRecord, with more resources being added to the <u>knowledge hub</u> soon.

Next steps

We'll continue developing the Rewilding Network participatory map, organising more events focused on taking action for wildlife, citizen science training and practical 'how to' rewild workshops. We're liaising with Devon Rewilding Group and Rewilding Britain to see how we can share resources and raise awareness. We'll also look to facilitate inspiring site visits as covid restrictions ease.
