# **Build A Joke**

### with Dan de la Motte

Tues 9th March 2021 - great for families!

Dan de la Motte's Guide to Being Silly (Copyright Dan de la Motte, 2021)

<u>BEING SILLY</u> (or 'nonsensical' or 'odd') is another way to make jokes – such like Harry Hill or Vic and Bob (famous comedians)

#### The rules:

- Think of an object, it doesn't have to be exciting My example is 'wardrobe'
- 2) Think of one/two things to describe it It has two doors It has lots of coat-hangers



- 3) Think of a completely different activity, that your object can't do Go on a trampoline
- 4) What happens with the thing you thought of at Stage 3? You bounce up and down
- 5) Put together your answers for Stage 2 and Stage 4

  Two doors

  Lots of coat-hangers

  Bounce up and down
- 6) This then becomes the question What has two doors, lots of coat-hangers and bounces up and down?
- 7) The answer is Stage 1 doing Stage 3!

  A wardrobe on a trampoline!

If you're stuck, here's another example:

- 1) Kettle
- 2) Boils water
- 3) Skateboarding
- 4) Whizzes the street on wheels
- 5) Boils water and whizzes down the street on wheels
- 6) What boils water and whizzes down the street on wheels?
- 7) A kettle on a skateboard!

<u>PUNS</u> involve something called WORDPLAY – we use words that rhyme with or sound a bit like another word to make a joke.

The rules:

1) Think of a word

My example is: QUACK

- 2) Think of a word that rhymes or sounds like the word you thought of QUACK rhymes with TRACK
- 3) That new word you thought of, what is it normally associated with?

  TRACK RAILWAY TRACK
- 4) Replace that rhyming word with the word you thought of at Stage 1

  RAILWAY QUACK
- 5) Make up a joke where your Stage 4 answer can be the joke What do duck trains run on?

  Railway Quacks!

If you're stuck, here's another example:

- 1) MICE
- 2) RICE
- 3) RICE PUDDING
- 4) MICE PUDDING
- 5) What's a cat's favourite dessert? Mice pudding!

Or...

- 1) KERMIT (the frog)
- 2) PERMIT
- 3) A PARKING PERMIT
- 4) A PARKING KERMIT
- 5) What do you need to park your muppet? A Parking Kermit
